Principal's Word Safety Bay Families,

It has been a great start to the term with students carrying on from where they left off last term. I've heard many great stories of family adventures from the holiday break and I myself, enjoyed two weeks camping in Coral Bay with friends and family which has left me refreshed and ready to go for the term ahead.

Our *You Can Do It* focus for today was Confidence and it was great to see so many students sporting the yellow colours at this morning's assembly. Students from Peron 9 and 10 put on a fantastic assembly item all about reading, which was enjoyed by the students and many family members who attended. Developing confidence in children at school and at home is an important factor in them achieving success and progressing in their learning. Having confidence to step out of their comfort zone in the academic or social and emotional aspects of school life will allow students to maximise their learning opportunities and allow them to face challenges as they arise. *Success is Progress* and the ability for students to tackle new concepts and adapt is greatly impacted by their confidence.

Research from experts in the field of child development and Psychology share some common tips around helping your child to develop confidence:

Teach resilience and encourage them to have a go

Promote problem solving

Look for ways to help others

Set goals and make plans to achieve them

Help them to deal positively with disappointment

The performance at Koorliny Arts Centre last night was amazing. Mrs Patterson and Mrs Quealy had their dance and music acts performing a range of items, highlighting the many talents of our Year 5 and 6 students. Dads make a difference

Being a father

A father is a male parent or carer of a child. A father may not be biologically related to his child or live with his child all the time.

He may be a grandfather, step-father, foster father or adoptive father of a child. In this resource, the terms 'dad' and 'father' include these relationships. Some children might have more than one father or relationships with other males who undertake a significant portion of parenting and care giving. There is no one right way to be a father. Each father brings unique ideas and experience to being a parent or carer and has a lot to contribute to the mental health and wellbeing of his child and family.

There are different ways families are constructed. For example, some families have many people, some have few people, some have people of different genders, ages, and cultural backgrounds. Some children have contact with a father, while others do not. It is not necessary for a child to have a father figure in their life for them to be able to feel loved, secure and happy in their family. Supporting a child and having their best interests in mind is what is important, as this has a positive impact on their mental health and wellbeing.

A father and his child building their relationship together is a special and deeply rewarding experience.

Why are fathers important?

Children benefit from secure, loving relationships with their parents and carers. Not long after birth, babies start to notice that their mum and dad feel, sound, smell and look different from each other and from other people. In particular, a baby might notice that their father has a deeper voice and bigger hands, and may spend lots of time looking at their dad, fascinated, noticing everything that is unique to him. When dads bond, engage and spend time with their baby, they are introducing their child to something new and interesting - their dad!

Did you know?

- Young children who receive lots of affection from their dad will have a more secure relationship with him.
- Children whose fathers are involved in their life are more likely to be emotionally secure, confident to explore their surroundings, and have a better social connection with their peers.
- Men who are involved in their child's life feel more confident and effective as a parent or carer, find parenthood more enjoyable, feel more important to their child, and feel encouraged to be involved.
- When fathers are involved in their child's everyday activities (eg eating meals together, reading and helping with homework), children tend to have fewer behaviour difficulties and better social skills.
- How a father feels about being a dad and how he cares for his child has a large influence on a child's social and emotional development.

Children whose fathers feel good about being a dad and are sensitive and responsive to their needs tend to have better social and emotional skills. Dads being involved It is important that **fathers connect with their children.**

Fathers and families can get involved with their children and the school or early childhood service by:

- becoming familiar with their school or early childhood service and getting to know the staff
- sharing children's developmental milestones with staff
- giving feedback to the staff about experiences their child has enjoyed (eg a weekend trip to the zoo or a family picnic)
- listening and talking to their children regularly to help their child learn, even if their child cannot understand words yet
- explaining to their child how things in the world work and having a go at answering their questions (eg "Why is the sky blue?")

Schools and early childhood services can encourage father involvement by:

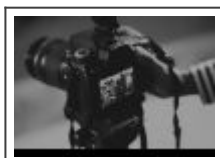
- including dads when making contact with families (eg initiating discussions with mothers and fathers, asking fathers specific questions about how their child is going, keeping in regular contact with fathers via text messaging and email)
- providing an environment that is friendly and welcoming to fathers (eg having photos of children and their dads, putting up posters of children interacting with male adults)
- creating opportunities for dads to spend time at the school or early childhood service and meet other dads (eg by organising specific father and child events such as a dads' breakfast or a Saturday playgroup)
- taking time to build trust and form relationships with fathers who are new to the service or school
- promoting and getting involved in community events that may be of interest to dads.

Online delivery of student reports

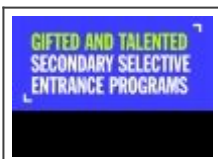
We are excited to be one of the 141 schools across WA who will be delivering student reports online to our parents.

We are still able to provide a traditional hard copy of your child's report as well as the online version. If you would like a formal hard copy then please inform a staff member at the front office.

Free Teen Parenting Seminars!

Three free seminars will be presented by school psychologists Brooke Ramsay and Sharon Jones and are suitable for all parents of teenagers or children in their last years of primary school.

Seminar 1: Raising responsible teenagers (7th November 6.30pm-8pm)

Parents are introduced to the to the six key elements of teenagers becoming responsible and specific ideas about how to teach and encourage skills such as - developing a healthy lifestyle, being respectful and considerate, getting involved in family activities, taking part in family decision making, being reliable and being assertive.

Seminar 2: Raising competent teenagers (14th November 6.30pm-8pm)

Parents are introduced to six aspects of teenagers becoming confident and successful in school and the community. Parents are given specific ideas to teach and encourage the following - developing self-discipline, establishing good routines, getting involved in school activities, being a good problem solver, following school rules and having supportive friends.

Seminar 3: Getting teenagers connected (21st November 6.30pm-8pm)

Parents are introduced to different aspects of teaching their teenagers to develop supportive friendships and become engaged in appropriate social and recreational groups and activities in the wider community. Parents are given specific ideas about teaching their teenagers the following skills - being confident, being socially skilled, planning ahead, meeting commitments, keeping in contact, and taking care of others.
